SEWFAB

In SewFab enrichment students have been working on a variety of projects this year using both sewing machines and hand stitching. Beginning with pincushions to develop basic skills, students have progressed to making stuffed toys, scrunchies and other hair accessories, and face masks. They are now working on designing a bag of their choice. These include tote bags, beach bags, cross-body bags and drawstring bags. Later in the year we will move onto making clothing items.





In the ACT there are 88 public schools, over 49,000 public school students and around 3,800 educators. But of course, I understand that for each of us as parents, the most important school is the school our children go to. That's why I want to make sure that every public school is a great school.

The ACT Government is upgrading and expanding public schools to make sure that learning environments are accessible and sustainable.

The government is committed to ensuring that every public school has the infrastructure to support high-quality education and that's why the government has been investing more than \$115 million to upgrade public schools right across the Territory.

Here at Lanyon High School the government has provided:

- an upgrade of the phone system to a modern digital network, including new phones, servers and an uninterruptable power supply for emergencies;
- an audio-visual upgrade in the hall for assembly and other events including a hearing loop, microphone and speakers;
- refurbished existing spaces into a new small group learning space with a quiet area;
- greater thermal comfort in general and specialist learning spaces, and also the sickbay through ceiling fans and cooling systems;
- painting of the stage in the hall;
- a full refurbishment to the Enrichment Centre, including new flooring, double-glazing, Interactive Flat Panel screen, heating, ventilation and cooling;
- new furniture for the refurbished areas;
- additional flagpoles to display the Australian, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags, to recognise and respect Australia's first people, and demonstrate our commitment to reconciliation and an inclusive and welcoming community;
- new automatic doors in the main entry airlock to improve security; and
- new double-glazing to six external doors to improve energy efficiency.

Additionally, concrete trip hazards were fixed, and lawn works completed as well as upgrades to the student services and administration area finished as part of the ACT Government's fast track stimulus program. This program has fast-tracked a range of infrastructure and maintenance projects on government-owned community, schools and other buildings, at a total cost of \$35 million, to support local businesses and keep Canberrans employed.

Every child and family has a place in ACT public schools regardless of their background or life circumstances. That's why this investment into public school infrastructure goes beyond just the basic things that allow learning and teaching to take place. The ACT Government invests in public schools to make sure that every student has what they need to be included, and to learn and develop their interests, passions and life skills.

The ACT Government has upgraded heating and cooling systems, reducing polluting emissions and making temperatures comfortable and conducive to learning in over 40 older public schools across Canberra.

The government also provided 4,000 Chromebooks to schools at the beginning of this school year and a further 3,000 Chromebooks and 500 iPads were purchased for use during the COVID-19 pandemic to assist with remote learning.

Schools have seen upgraded classrooms, toilets, libraries, canteens and bike shelters, as well as gardens, landscaping and playground areas in schools to make sure that these spaces are positive and accommodating.

As Canberra grows, the government is making sure that schools grow with it. Every child has the right to access education and the ACT Government is making sure that this right is equally ensured for every young person.
